



KS2 FACTSHEET 14 Safety Songs

Phow to use this worksheet

- Before the lesson, select some simple songs for the children to listen to (pop songs or show tunes are ideal as they feature repetition and choruses, as long as their lyrics are appropriate for use with children).
- Ask them to listen to the music and identify the key phrases. Ask why they picked these out. Do they tell a story, communicate a message or attitude or mood? Introduce the term 'lyrics'. Play some other pop songs and focus on how the melody reflects the lyrics. Can the children identify repeated 'catch' phrases? Consider how the melody reflects the phrases. For example: a short sequence of notes that is easy to remember, a predictable pattern in the pitch. Focus on the purpose of the words: to question, instruct, command, recount. Help the children to recognise how the melody affects how the words are sung: for example, it might begin strongly



and become weaker or it might maintain a 'solid' strength.

Key Electricity Facts

- Children should be protected from danger from electricity but should also develop appropriate responsibility for their own safety. The songs could remind them about water and electricity. For example: drying thoroughly after a bath or shower before using electrical appliances, or keeping drinks away from TVs, DVD players, computers and games consoles.
- The children can use their written notes or instructions on electrical safety for inspiration, fitting the words to the rhythm of a song chorus. They could experiment to find the one that best fits the purpose of their song to instruct. Encourage them to change or repeat words but to ensure that the safety message is clear and that it will gain the attention of their audience and communicate a simple message.
- They could sing their songs to another group who could help appraise them, commenting on how well they have matched words to rhythm and on the effect they create.

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Exercise Extension: Find an instrumental version of the classes chosen song to play in the background whilst they perform and help them keep to the rhythm and beat.
